Indian Day is proving a great attraction to the natives and from the far north and from Babine, Hazelton, Cheslatta, Fraser Lake and Stella the natives are said to be making for Burns Lake over 500 strong. Big prizes are hung up and much local interest is being exhibited in the program. A war dance will be one of the features of attraction to all.

VERNE LAUDS BURNS LAKE MEET

Western Winter Sport Authority Speaks 'Highly Of Ski Tournament Held at Burns Lake

"Of all the events of such a nature, the provincial championship ski meet of the Omineca Ski Club at Burns Lake last week was the best organized I have ever taken part in," states Rudolph J. Verne, manager of the Canadian-Scandinavian Import & Export Co. of Vancouver, who is in the city. Mr. Verne arrived here on Sunday afternoon from the interior and will sail on the Prince Rupert Thursday night for the south. Great credit, he says, is due the officials of the Omineca Ski Club and the citizens of Burns Lake for the way that all arrangements, even to the minutest detail, were so successfully carried out. The hospitality shown the visitors there and the sporting instinct of the people of Burns Lake are also highly lauded by Mr. Verne. Even the old timers took an active part in the event

and Mr. Verne was much impressed with this.

"All the skiers who attended the Burns Lake meet are going away boosting the club to the limit and will be back in large numbers next year for the tournament was staged in a wonderful manner, considering the size of the town," declares Mr. Verne.

Mr. Verne, who for several years was sporting editor of a Stockholm (Sweden) newspaper, has attended three Olympic Games and is considered one of the best authorities of the west on winter sports. Accompanying him on his visit to the city is Eric Sandstrom of the Viking Club, Vancouver, who won the 50-Kilometer ski race at Burns Lake for the Western Canada championship, his time having been three hours, thirty-five minutes and 50 seconds.
