

# Beatty beats rush to sprint gold

The final tune-up before she tackles World Cup competition in Ski Tour Canada, Dariah Beatty completed a two-race weekend sweep on the cross-country slopes of Prince George. The 21-year-old from White-horse, Yukon, was content to tailgate behind Olivia Bouffard-Nesbitt for most of Saturday's open women sprint final at the Haywood NorAm/Buff Sprints. Haywood Norah Bull Sprints Western Canadian championships at Otway Nordic Centre. But once that finish line was in sight, Beatty kicked into passing gear and beat the clock ahead of Bouffard-

Nesbitt.
"I was really happy to get another win, it was a fun course and having Olivia right in there the whole time it was a really competi-tive race and I was able to have a strong finish and outsprint her to

the finish," said Beatty. "Coming down the last chute I was still behind her and I just pounced when I had the chance."

Overnight rain Saturday made for tricky wax conditions for the classic race and Beatty and her wax team had to re-wax her grip zone before she tackled the steep, hilly course.

"Warming up for the heats I wasn't getting any kick and my coaches completely redid my siks right before my race," said Beatty, who qualified second-quickest behind Bouffard-Nesbitt of Fondeurs-Laurentides (Morin Heighs, Que). "I was able to stride everything, I didn't have to herringtone at all, which really made a difference."

driver's seat.
"I'm real happy to get that lead back! I had before Christmas and I'm looking forward to Tour Canada," said Beatty, who raced two individual and two team World Cups in Slovenia and Czech Republic in January." of racing in 12 days (March 1-12) when Ski Tour Canada brings the World Cup rour to Gatineau, Que, Quebec City, Montreal and Canmore. Fourteen males and 12 females will make the Canadian team. The three-day Western Canadian even in Prince George was the last chance for skiers to qualify for the tour.

"Twe never done that much racing close together so it will be a real test of fitness and an amazing experience," said Beatty. "There's three sprints and five distance races. The last four races are in Canmore. I've been training there for three-and-a-half years so I'll have a bit of home course advantage, for sure."

hold off fellow Ontarian Patrick Stewart-Jones of Nakkertok Ski Club to win the 1.4km race. With that win, Thompson locked up his spot on Ski Tour Canada.

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"It was real close, I knew it was going to come right down to Patrick and I. I guess I had a bit more at the finish," said Thompson. 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### **Quebec skier Browne qualifies for Tour**

Cendrine Browne was worried about course conditions for Sunday's 15-kilometre classic race at the Haywood NorAm/

The overnight freeze made the already-challenging downhills at Otway Nordic Centre a bit more dicey, and she had the choice of putting on the brakes to make those tight corners safer, or just let gravity take over. take over.

The 22-year-old from St. Jerome, Que, Jed from start to finish, completing the course 52 seconds ahead of second-place Annika Hicks of Canmore Nordic, who was just six-tenths of a second in front of bronze medalist Katherine Stewart-Jones of Nakkertok, Our

"I was afraid of the downhills, but they weren't so bad," Browne said. "It was so icy and I was afraid of losing my kick (wax) on the downhills because when you skid you lose all your kliser. There's a lot of big uphills on the course so having good kick is important, but I had great skis. My grip was excellent."

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Browne spent a week before the NorAm races training at altitude at Lake Louise and was not feeling physically strong when she started her weekend at Otway. Despite



that, she was fifth in Friday's 10km free-style race and made the A-final in Satur-

Browne's next challenge is Ski Tour
Canada, an eight-race, 12-day World Cup tour event March 1-12 which stops in Gatineau, Que, Montreal, Quebec City and Canmore. She will be part of a 12-female, 14-male Canadian team on the Tour.

"I'm really excited to race World Cups in Canada, I'm going to be able to race in front of my family and friends, racing the best in the world," Browne said. "I disome World Cups earlier this season in Europe but that's not the same as racing at

home. It's a pretty big advantage because we won't have jet lag and we can eat the food we're used to eating. There's a lot of snow in Quebec right now. I hope the Europeans will be happy about the nice trails."

The 21-year-old Palmer-Charette fin-ished in 53:11.5, just one-tenth of second ahead of Shields and a five-tenths before Stewart-Jones.
Palmer-Charette raced at the 2015 Cana-da Winter Games in Prince George, where

he finished second in the 15km freestyle race and anchored Team Ontario to gold in the relay. He said this past weekend's conditions at Otway – fast trails, warm sumy weather – were virtually the same as what he encountered a year ago.

"Id say this is my favourrie venue other than home. Lappe Nordic, so I was pumped to come back here once again," said Palmer-Chartet. "Teally like the tenchical downhills – skiing those well is definitely an attribute of mine. I also like the longer, more gradual climbs that are on the trail system here, nor like short steep pitchy ones. Hove the weather here. Is it like this all the time?"

In other open category results, Gareth Williams of Telemark Ski Club (West Kelowna) won the junior men's race, with Caelan McLean of Whitehorse, Yukon, second and Peter Hicks of Cammore claiming bronze. 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# Otway 'course really suits me,' says Thompson

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"I went out of the track and came up beside him and we might have touched poles a bit and he felt he missed a few poles with that," said Thompson, who was unsure if Stewart-Jones would lodge a protest.

Thompson, who turns 25 on Feb. 27, just missed the age cutoff to compete in the 2015 Canada Winter Games in Prince George. This was his first time racing at Otway and he was impressed with the sprint course layout.

"The course really suits me, a lot of double-poling and there was a bit of ice on the corners this morning and that got a few guys," said Thompson, who also won the NorAm classic sprint in Canmore. "Classic sprinting is kind of my specialty. I started to be more of a sprinter last year and I'm still trying to maintain the all-around and I'm still having a few good distance results."

Thompson, who was eighth in Friday's 15km freestyle race, came to Prince George ranked fourth in the Canadian NorAm standings and was fifth in the Buff Sprint points
